Dear Donors, Partners and Volunteers,



As we all know, 2021 was a year filled with unprecedented challenges. It was an especially difficult time for low-income families, and as the year came to a close, we were keenly aware of the impact the pandemic had on our students. During 2021, a significant

number of students experienced more anxiety and despair than ever, which was made worse by the food and housing insecurity. Many were unable to receive sufficient in-person guidance from their high school counselors that would enable them to successfully navigate the formidable task of applying to college. It is also important to recognize that in 2021, while our students faced extraordinary obstacles, they proved themselves to be resilient and determined to reach their goals. They simply needed a helping hand.

Fortunately, College Access Partnership was able to give much-needed assistance by providing services and guidance to over 170 students in 2021. Our virtual and in-person workshops, *Funding Your College Education Virtual Conference*, small group meetings, tutoring, one-to-one college counseling, mentoring, and growing scholarship program provided students with the support needed to successfully navigate the admissions process and to find funding to pay for their education. Our students responded by working hard and were able to achieve their goals.

Looking toward the future, we know that no matter what the admissions landscape looks like in 2022 and beyond, College Access Partnership is equipped to serve even more students who need our help. We will continue to work with our partners, offering a full-range of college counseling services, and through our new College Access Program, we will provide college counseling support that begins in January of junior year and continues to the end of senior year. We anticipate serving as many as 200 students in 2022 through all of our programs and feel gratified that we can offer assistance, especially during these difficult times.

It is clear that there are many more students who need our help. This is why we are so grateful for the support we receive from our generous donors, partners and volunteers who make our work possible. This is a team effort and we are convinced that no matter how daunting the challenges may appear, we can all make a difference when we work together.

The College Access Program

A Group of Students Who Learn and Grow Together

College Access Partnership has had great success working in partnership with organizations that embrace our mission. We are currently working with several different groups of students, which we refer to as the “cohort model.” This model relies on our community partners to refer students that will join us in small, eclectic groups that learn and grow together, creating a sort of family support. In that some of our programs have limited space, we have found an abundance of qualified students that could not be accommodated. Therefore, this year, we have also formed our own cohort, The College Access Program, as part of a plan to serve even more students. This program implements a yearlong college readiness curriculum that meets twice per month across Los Angeles and Orange Counties.

When we first meet with a new cohort, usually in the early spring of their junior year of high school, we begin an intensive training in the skills it will take to navigate the complexities of college education. Some of the topics included in this comprehensive curriculum are finding the colleges that are the best fit, learning the application process, understanding the financial aid process, and learning how to write a great college essay. We are also steadily growing our curriculum to include financial and life skills, teaching students how to create a budget, balance a checking account, write a cover letter and conduct an effective interview. It is in these latter areas that our mentors and volunteer counselors are essential. It has become apparent that blending the group work, along with providing one-to-one support as needed, is truly a winning combination and a recipe for student success.

The Many Faces of the Hero’s Journey

A Student’s Personal Story

College essay readers are a tough audience. Every year they face towers of essays, and will be looking for any way to narrow down the number of students they will have to consider seriously. So, our students have just a few hundred words to make a compelling case that they belong. And with the SAT seemingly going the way of the dinosaurs, the essay now shoulders a larger burden in making that case.

One way our students are grabbing the attention of weary readers is to present themselves in the story cycle that has grabbed the ears of listeners since the beginning of time: The Hero’s Journey. The journey that Joseph Campbell mapped can have a million variations, but also some universal themes, such as a call to adventure, trials to test readiness, and a return with some hard-won wisdom or knowledge.

Around the midpoint of the journey, between the ordinary world of the status quo and extraordinary one that the hero seeks, is a line called The Threshold of Adventure. If this line is not crossed, the adventure is never born. The essays we see tell stories of facing difficult trials in approaching this threshold, and of preparing to see the other side.

Most of our students will be the first in their families to apply to college, and so are questing in uncharted territory. Without the luxury of guidance and support from home, their trials have begun long before they begin the application process. But their fire and drive to face any obstacle already show candidates who are both willing to take on college, and worthy of a heroic challenge.



Services Provided Free of Charge

College Counseling

College Access Partnership offers assistance through every step of the college admission process, including pursuing financial assistance.

Test Prep and Tutoring

Test prep is conducted via one-to-one tutoring sessions, small group classes and/or online instruction. Formal academic assessments of students are also conducted to identify areas of challenge and the tutoring services needed to address those areas.

Workshops

Workshops are offered to college-bound students and their families covering a variety of topics including: an overview of the college admissions process, funding a college education and finding your career path.

Mentoring

Mentors provide valuable guidance during the student's entire journey. This support is available to students during the admissions process, when they attend college and when they are pursuing a career.

Volunteer Program



Our volunteer counselors, mentors, and tutors are invaluable to the work done by College Access Partnership. By generously giving of their time and talents, we are able to offer a level of guidance and support to our students that would otherwise not be possible. She is wise beyond her years. Through her writing, both fiction and non-fiction, she continually expresses the importance she puts on self-care. She shares about her journey to understanding, accepting, and loving self by writing about her developing relationship with her body, her sexuality, and her family.

Only occasionally does Ameena speak to the adversity she has faced. At a young age, she has moved homes from living with her biological mother in Northern California to moving to Los Angeles with her aunt whom she refers to as “mom.” She has navigated familial mental instability, which left her responsible for both her younger siblings and herself. And while I was shocked by how little Ameena focused on those moments of strife and pain, I quickly learned that it is because Ameena oozes positivity. She does not only talk the talk in regards to the power of positivity, but she truly walks the walk.

Ameena applied to a handful of schools in Southern California and one in Georgia. Her schools ranged from California State Universities, to UCs, to private four-year institutions. Each school provided Ameena with the opportunity to pursue her love of creative writing and desire to care for others. Through studying Screenwriting,

Ameena will work towards her dream of writing a television show “that has a positive impact on people’s lives.” Television has been a “best friend” to Ameena during moments of adversity, and she hopes to create that relationship with her audience via the scripts she creates. She also values the study of the human brain and mental health so that she can know how to best support people throughout her career.

2022 was an extremely competitive year for admissions. Many schools experienced an exponential increase in their number of applicants, which resulted in many rejections as well. But this shift in admissions did not phase Ameena. After Ameena received all of her admissions decisions, she had six superb schools to choose from. Her top choices were Chapman University, CSU, Long Beach, and CSU, Northridge.

We are very excited to see where Ameena decides to pursue her passions for the next four years. I feel immense gratitude that we have been able to experience Ameena’s light and have been a part of her investment in self. I believe the college environment, and her collegiate studies in Screenwriting and Psychology, will allow Ameena to reach a new level of activating her power.


